HISTORY OF THE CLUB NEWSLETTER:

Newsletter history article for the 100th edition:

WAS Nº1 FIRST?

The earliest club communication I have come across so far is a rewritten, handwriting copy of 7th April 1993 meeting minutes, when George Hill was Secretary and the club was meeting in the Uniting Church Meeting Rooms, Wonthaggi. Typewritten copies first appeared for 2nd March 1994 meeting at the same venue, with Bob Bristow as Secretary.

Both formats were under the title "Wonthaggi Woodcrafters Incorporated".

Hartley Tobin introduced the first club newsletter titled **"Wonthaggi Woodies"** in April 1995 after 5th April 1995 meeting now being held in the Pigeon Club Rooms, still with Bob Bristow as Secretary. The newsletter was two pages on one sheet of A4 paper with three cartoon style characters and a modern layout. This publication was a major departure from anything we had before and a wonderful new asset to the club.

The *"Woodies"* newsletter continued until 7th May 1997 with Hartley at the helm, when the tiller was handed on to Joe Bowland who altered the style for the June 1997 newsletter. Someone changed the style again for the next (July 1997) newsletter, which then continued until 4th May 1998, where the title changed back to 'Wonthaggi Woodcrafters" with Joe Bowland as Editor.

This edition introduced the club saw blade logo with the lathe and hand tools. The club relocated into the Community Development Learning Centre, (CDLC, Classroom N° 3 with our own cupboard) for meetings not long after on 3rd June 1998. The CDLC name had changed to Bass Coast Adult Education Centre (BCAEC) for our 3rd February 1999 meeting and remained so until the recent change to the Jean Meltzer Centre.

After another makeover and name change to "The Wonthaggi Woodcrafter" in November 1998, this style and title continued until February 2000, then to be replaced by a mixture of meeting minute's style and periodic editions of the *"The Wonthaggi Woodie"*, again by Hartley. This mixture continued until the end of 2006.

Hartley's club welcome to 2007 was a single A4 sheet newsletter (January 2007), printed on both sides and folded into three giving 6 pages of news under the new title, **"The Wonthaggi Woody"**. Although not numbered, the third edition was N°3. I think it is fair to say, this can be considered the first edition! Hartley brought the newsletter back to single page A4 format for Edition 5, May 2007 and introduced colour in Edition 9, September 2007.

Well done Hartley, the club is a lot better off for your pioneering literary skills amongst a lot of other things.

Spelling tells us that N°1 was first with *Woody*; pronunciation takes us back 20 years to give the *April 1995, Woodie* first, which record do you claim, the *y* or *ie*?

SHORT HISTORY OF THE CLUB – OKKE HUITEMA:

A Special Interview by Tony Hughes for newsletter Edition 100

To help celebrate this special edition, we asked our first President, a Life Member and active club participant, Okke Huitema and his wife, Betty, to share their thoughts on where the club has come from, how it's faring and where to from here?

The following are highlights from a longer record which will be included in the club history. When doctors advised Okke his crook back wasn't getting better and he should give up work, early retirement was really not on his radar or what he wanted to hear. As is the character of the man, he accepted their sound advice and set about making constructive use of his now ample free time. After learning woodworking at the local school and making furniture for home, his strong interest in wood took him to learn woodturning at Leongatha. After two years of this, Okke got together with Harry Oates and George Hill to find out if a woodcrafting club could be started in Wonthaggi. Fourteen men and one woman met in the Wonthaggi South Recreation Reserve Cricket Club Rooms on the 22nd February 1989 and enthusiastically agreed it could.

Apart from something to help fill in his time, Okke wanted a club:

Where everyone could socialise, help each other, learn new skills, gain more knowledge and extend their abilities in a safe environment.

Okke and Betty believe this has happened, are really pleased with what the club has achieved and how it operates. New members come and go, a good percentage put a lot of effort in for the benefit of all. People enjoy getting together and the club tries to help the local community.

As Wonthaggi and the club continue to grow with both members and the range of activities, they can see more workshops and facilities will be needed, possibly on another, bigger site, to meet our needs. The club has a bright future if we continue to help, share our knowledge and support each other.

Thanks Okke and Betty, your vision appears to be in safe hands.


Segmented Turning Helper Software- Update

In the January 2015 issue of the Woodies Newsletter, I introduced the Segmented Turning Helper Software, a Windows programme I have developed over the last few months to assist members doing segmented turning projects with the calculations of segment lengths.

In this update I describe two new features that have been added to the software.


Index Wheels

The software will accurately draw and print commonly used index wheels as shown in the screen shot below. The printed index wheel may be pasted on an appropriate piece of MDF board 4-6mm and the desired index holes drilled with accuracy.



Regular Geometric Figures

Ever needed an accurate image of a triangle, square, pentagon, hexagon, etc? Not easy to draw accurately by hand. The Segmented **Turning Helper** Software will draw the required geometric figure accurately all the time. Specify the figure you want and the required side length and the programme will draw it for you. A

LIGHTING: When working with any woodworking machines, use good lighting so that the work piece, cutting blades, and machine controls can be seen clearly. Position or shade lighting sources so they do not shine in the operator's eyes or cause any glare and reflections. Lights on flexible arms are best, especially when working in confined space or with a hollow workpiece.

However, whatever lighting layout you use, consider LED globes and tubes. Yes, they cost substantially more, but use a fraction of the power, are extremely long lasting and are very safe as, unlike all the other forms of lighting, they generate little heat. A large 20W LED flood light (equivalent to approx. 140w incandescent, 100w Halogen or 30w CFL) will cost \$30 to \$40 if purchased online from an Australian seller with an Aussie warranty.

The \$170 earned selling the planters (38) was donated to the "Friends of the Mine" for which they were very excited and grateful.


Thanks to Ron Snooks and the team including Pat Smith for putting on a good day for the club, it is great being part of our local community.

YMCA Holiday Program at the Club Rooms, Tuesday, 31st March 2015



As an only child, I was born in Altona and lived in Newport until I was 21. I attended Williamstown High School and then went on to Melbourne Teacher's College. Carol and I married in 1972 and we lived for some years in

West Footscray before building our first house in Gisborne where we remained for 15 years. From there we shifted to Bendigo for 17 years and we have now been in Inverloch for 9 years. We have two daughters, one residing in Melbourne and the other in Brisbane. They each have two beautiful little girls. Boys are hard to come by in our family as Carol is also one of two girls. We've even got a female dog! Thankfully, I have two great son-in-laws to do the "boys' stuff" with when we all get together.

After graduating from Teacher's College, I spent the next 35 years as a primary school teacher. Carol was also a primary teacher. I was appointed Vice Principal of St Albans North Primary School in 1988 and thus began an initiation into administering schools in tough areas. I became Principal of Bendigo Violet Street Primary School at a relatively early age and after 4 tough years was looking for a change. I resigned and Carol and I started a Computer Education Centre in Bendigo. After several years of sampling a life away from teaching, we got out of the business and I returned to teaching until retirement. Or should I say semi-retirement, as I took on the role as an ICC International Cricket Match Referee.

In 1970, I was selected in the State practice squad and played my first State Sheffield Shield game against Western Australia at the MCG in 1972. In 1974, I was selected in the Australian Test Team to play New Zealand in Adelaide. In 1977 I had to choose between an offer to play for Kerry Packer or to stay with the 'hierarchy'. I chose the latter, as I really wanted to play for Australia. Consequently, I played a full Ashes series in 1978 and my first-class cricket career spanned 9 seasons until a severe back injury brought it to a sudden end whilst on a tour of India with the Australian team and after just 12 Tests. I went from being named one of Wisden's World Cricketers of the Year in 1979 to being totally out of the game two years later. However, over the following years I kept involved, including roles as a commentator for ABC radio cricket for 10 seasons and ABC television for 5 seasons. I also wrote feature articles on cricket for the Bendigo Advertiser. In 2004, I received an offer from Cricket Australia to be nominated for four available International Match Referee positions. There were 17 applicants interviewed from 8 countries, but I was lucky enough to be offered one of the roles. Being one of just 7 Referees supervising all International cricket was quite a challenging role, but I loved it, although at times stresses were extreme. Being overseas for up to 7 months of the year was demanding and I decided to retire fully in 2011.

Since then I've enjoyed life to the full. Carol and I are both heavily involved in community activities. Carol's choirs, church, Probus and knitting groups commitments keep her pretty busy and as President of Inverloch Probus this year, I've also got plenty on my plate. Besides looking after my 96 year old mother and seeing our kids and grandkids when I can, the Woodies has become a big part of my life. I love the Club and the great lot of people involved. With a growing membership, the Club can only get better and I look forward to being an active Member into the future. WOODCRAFTING TIPS AND TRICKS:

Increasing the flexibility of a Vicmarc Vacuum Chuck: I have sometimes had a need to use my 100mm Vicmarc vacuum chuck on larger natural edge bowls, but have found the depth of the bowl restricts the vacuum cleaner insert, so the chuck is inoperable. Since a vacuum plate is also not suitable, I have produced a modification which not only adds length to the cylinder, but width to the face. Both of these dimensions considerably increase the size of the piece that can be turned effectively. It cost nothing to make and it works extremely well. I used very dry, stable hardwood so there would be no warping and the rubber seals are cut from a thin mouse pad, which is both flexible and durable. See pictures below. *Alan Hurst*
