"After retirement in 1989 we decided to leave the "Big Smoke" and relocate to Inverloch which provides much interest with its close proximity to both beach and bush. It also offered me the pleasure of contributing to the community by being involved on executive positions with the local JP's Association, the Wonthaggi Heart Support Branch, Anderson's Inlet Probus Club, the Wonthaggi Woodcrafters and the Gippsland Brach of the RAAF Association.

My other interests include my family, woodwork, military aircraft, reading and travel with Pauline who perhaps has had the greatest influence on my life by exhibiting her often stoic examples of never giving in, in adverse situations. Another person who influenced me was George Hill, Past President of the Woodies who is a perfectionist, believing that near enough is not good enough.

I joined the Wonthaggi Woodcrafters in 1993 to help improve my woodworking skills and have made some wonderful friends over the years. I believe that the success of this club should be recorded by the appointment of a club historian, plus more guest speakers at meetings".

WOODIES @ WORK

In our Newsletter we love highlighting what our members are doing at home as well as in our Club workshops. We have discovered that apart from being a very talented woodcrafter, Sandra Pietrolungo has even broader crafty skills. 'Little Max' (below) is a replica of one of Sandra's German Shepherds, made using a craft called Needle



Felting. Sandra explains "Needle Felting involves the use of fleece folded or rolled tightly and repeatedly stabbed with a barbed needle which in effect tangles the fibres together. The more you stab, the firmer the piece will be. In this case, I made a wire armature (frame) and built the shape by wrapping and stabbing the fleece around it. The fleece for the core

shape was from my own small flock of white sheep and the coloured top coat was from alpaca fleece which Lex Van Saane brought back from his trip to Tasmania, as well as other coloured sheep fleece. The craft requires a little patience, but I find it quite therapeutic".

Below is 'Big Max" and Little Max" together to give an idea of relative size. The right-hand picture shows Big Max in Sandra's workshop wearing appropriate safety gear. Well done Sandra, 10/10 from Woodies OHS Officer, Syd.

SAFETY FIRST

BE AWARE - It's not just bladed tools that can cause injuries. The photos below show the result of a joint on a large 6" sanding belt coming away and catching the wood being sanded, with no prior warning. The timber piece was broken and thrown around the workshop. A facemask prevented face injury, but no gloves led to a visit to hospital Emergency. Some of us have these machines at home and there are a couple at the Woodies.





The problem - Not all belt joints are the same. The weakest is the taped butt joint, as above. But joins can be welded, taped, glued, and jointed in several ways. Some use the very good Norlok finger join. However most common is still the taped butt joint, as it's the cheapest to produce and it allows for the belt to be run in both directions.

WARNING - don't try to make or glue your own large belts, no matter what is says on Google. On smaller belts like on drum sanders, it may be possible with great care.

<u>The lesson</u> - The belt didn't snap but still caused trauma, so wear a full face shield AND gloves AND regularly check the belt condition, especially at joins.

<u>My advice</u> after this incident is to stick with well-known brands such as Sia, Norton, Hermes, Kingspor, etc. They're more expensive, but hopefully more reliable and safer. Finally - check belt edges - some brands offer better edge retention, which could also lead to problems if unchecked.

Above is a turtle and ocean, carved on the end grain of a large log. All hand carved - no power tools. The simulated ocean is coloured epoxy. The turtle is finished with furniture wax.



Above is a carved bowl from an unknown timber. Again, it's been finished with furniture wax.




Yes it's finished and on the water at Newhaven Yacht Club, although there's some internal fitting out still to be done, before the champagne is put across the bow.
